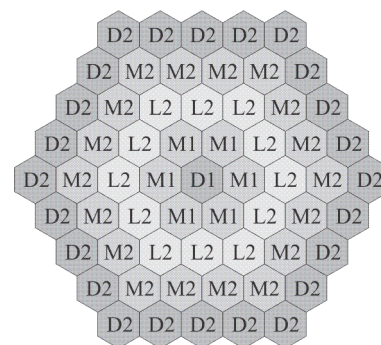


New Ways to Hexie: English Paper-less Piecing by Machine

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Supply List

When hexagon-shaped patches are arranged in concentric rings around a center, the resulting design is known as a Grandmother's Flower Garden. This classic arrangement is traditionally done by hand using a technique known as English paper piecing. But modern times have brought along new options and we will explore them in this workshop.



You may choose to make a single 5-fabric hexagon ring, a complete Grandmother's Flower Garden quilt top measuring 55 1/2" x 71", a scrappy hexie bed quilt, or an English paper pieced pattern of your choice. If you are using your own pattern, please consult it for the yardage requirements.

Other Supplies

- To make hexie templates:
 - 1 meter freezer paper (which must be removed) - approx. 242 hexies/meter
 - **OR** 1 meter of Apliquick interfacing (which can stay in) - approx. 500 hexies/meter
 - **OR** precut iron-on interfacing hexies (which can stay in) - packages of 100
- Water-soluble glue stick
- Apliquick rods (optional but helpful; will have sets available in class to try)
- Thread:
 - Monofilament (Invisible) thread with a neutral bobbin
 - **OR** Different colored threads to match each fabric
- Pencil
- Scissors
- Sewing machine **with an appliqué foot** (preferably a closed-toe, clear plastic foot for zigzag stitching patches together)
